



Proclaiming His Love and Faithfulness

It was Chuck Colson who said, "Sometimes God does not calm the storm - but He calms His child amidst the storm". The economic downturn that we continued to experience in 2009 allowed God to reveal His love and faithfulness to us in PMA. Once again we ended another fiscal year debt free - owing only a debt of gratitude to our faithful God and to our dedicated supporters and partners who have allowed themselves to be His channels of blessings. Because of this, our missionaries and mission volunteers continued to serve in various ministries in the Islands of Micronesia and Philippines with great motivation and with a great dependence on our Lord.

The Lord has faithfully seen to the safety and protection of our aviation pilots, aircraft, and our medical ship Sea Haven and her crew. Despite rising fuel and maintenance costs, PMA has been able to transport food, water, medical supplies, textbooks, patients and doctors, missionaries and staff to the Outer Islands. Of the total flights, 37% were non-revenue, which were supported by our revenue-generating flights - these provided needed transportation to the Yap's Outer Islands and to Palau.

The Sea Haven, after her dry docking in late 2008 on Guam, headed home to Pohnpei. En route there they delivered needed food and water, seeds for re-planting, and kayaks to small islands that still hadn't recovered from rising sea levels. During the second part of the fiscal year a medical trip to Kosrae was undertaken - this time concentrating on eye care and cataract surgery. Noteworthy was the training of a national doctor by our PMA Ophthalmologist, John Escote - so he could continue with the work in Kosrae. Dr. Likiaksa had initial training a few years ago for Eye Care, under the auspices of PMA and Christoffel-Blindenmission (CBM); the additional training would enable him to help his own people.

The Good News Press operations provide critical financial support for our Studio, Radio Station, Sea Haven and PMF church in Pohnpei, not to mention free printing for the national church and for PMA needs. We continue to be thankful for the program prepared by Roland Weibel that allows "The Cross" Radio to broadcast 24/7 and to give the exact time on the hour. Our volunteer on Guam, Wai Yi Ma, has been a source of encouragement as she devotedly downloads programs for our Radio Station, which are then sent via disc to Pohnpei. We give glory to God for the way the Radio ministry continues to touch and change many lives on Pohnpei. How we pray that the engineer who would repair the short wave antennas/transmitters could come soon, so that the Word of God can be spread throughout the Outer Islands of Pohnpei and Chuuk, as well.

Evangelism and church growth persevere through the ministry of PMF churches in Guam, Palau, Yap, Pohnpei and the Polilio Islands in the Philippines. This is the heart of PMA - bringing hope and changing lives for eternity. We faced many challenges and adversities that have stretched our faith and allowed us to recognize the ever-present help of God. In the Polilio Islands, Philippines, God faithfully protected our families there when several typhoons ravaged the region. As God answered prayers, many in the islands were awed by His power - bringing them to their knees in acknowledgement to Him.

Our Learning Center in Patnanungan, Philippines, serves a great need in the island - teaching children basic reading and writing skills, and more importantly - the Word of God. Many families have been brought to the saving knowledge of the Lord through the witness of their children. God is so good!

The Bahay Kalinga Orphanage continues to care for children, and at this time, it has opened its doors to other children for temporary shelter. Their parents are temporarily unable to care for them due to poverty and other social problems. We thank God that, as of the end of Fiscal Year 2009, the Lord allowed us to serve 169 children.

However, we have many projects, especially in the Philippines, that need funding: church and multi-purpose buildings must be constructed or existing ones desperately need repair, the Learning Center needs to be re-built, youth dormitories and pastors' dwellings require restoration. We continue to trust the Lord for His provision.

During the President's Conference in Arizona this past year, our Chief Development Officer, Harry Cawood, summed up what PMA needs with three "P" words - He challenged all that attended, as I challenge you today: to keep PRAYING for PMA and its missionaries; to PROMOTE PMA to your friends and family - PMA has a compelling story to tell and has been faithful in serving the people for over 35 years in Micronesia, and over 25 years in the Philippines. PARTNER with us so that many of those forgotten in the remote islands may be reached, and they will come to know Him Who is able to give them hope and change their lives for eternity!

Delita In Patnanungan

Last February a young mother in our community, Delita, suffered much pain during her fifth pregnancy and delivery, compared to her other children. During the difficult delivery, she lost her baby. She was distressed, not only physically, but emotionally, too. After leaving the hospital, Delita found refuge with Pacific Mission Fellowship and we allowed her to stay in a room at our Dorm.

Late that evening, her husband went to the dorm to look for her. He wanted to pray with her. Yet he didn't really know how to pray or who to pray to. My husband, Jun, and I had also gone there to pray, and we talked with Delita's husband about the Lord. That night he decided to dedicate his life to Jesus.

Delita and her husband have now committed their whole family to the Lord. The family actively comes to our church for prayer meetings, Bible studies, small group meetings, and whenever given the opportunity, they eagerly share their testimony of how the Lord has touched them.

Recently Delita attended a seminar for Sunday School leaders. We found that this dedicated young mom had some excellent teaching abilities. She's now a leader in our Sunday school. She also assists me in the Learning Center, she reads Bible stories to the children. I thank God for her dedication and love for these young children.

In her own words: "I am Delita Manlogan, a resident of Patnanungan, Quezon Province. I thank the Lord, for He's given me another chance to live with Christ in my heart. As a believer, I've faced many struggles, but these struggles have grown my courage and my strength. Before, when I had a struggle, I knew it was the end of world. But I was wrong. I suffered much when I delivered my youngest child. I was scared to death because I knew I had sinned against the Lord. But I called on Him and asked for His mercy. I confessed my sins, repented, and surrendered my life to Him once again. He lovingly accepted me back. He had allowed my difficulties so I'd recognize that He's the only one that can give me hope. He is my strength. Through my experience, my whole family has been drawn back to God and He has changed each one of us. I am now willing to serve the Lord no matter what He asks. I put my trust in the Lord our God!"

Sea Haven Tour to Chuuk Outer Islands

In August of 2009 PMA's Sea Haven ventured out on another of its many humanitarian missions of which I was fortunate enough to be a part. This particular tour did not include medical personnel, but rather, Rotary Club members from Japan, Guam, and Pohnpei. They accompanied the crew to set up and distribute solar water stills, jointly donated by Rotary Clubs from their respective areas, as well as the Club on Chuuk.

These water stills - whose Japanese designer was a Rotarian taking part in the voyage - are able to produce approximately a gallon of fresh water per day depending on typical amounts of sunlight. Each still consists of a sloped hard plastic box with an open top and a sheet of Plexiglas, that is attached to the box, atop a rubber seal, adhered with many plastic clips. Once the glass is sealed, two holes remain, one on the higher part of the slope where salt water is poured, the other on the lower side of the slope, where fresh water drips out. This process works through sunlight striking the glass, which heats the salt water. This evaporates into the glass, resulting in condensation which slides down the glass and into a drain. The drain funnels the newly-desalinated water through the lower opening and into a container.

A side product of the desalination is the salt that remains. When drawn from a clean source, salt can be produced, sparing the need to use tedious, alternative methods of desalination, such as boiling water. The Rotarians demonstrated how the process works on each island we visited, and we determined the number of stills to be delivered according to population size. While most islands received approximately thirty stills, the main idea was to give enough so that every family could have one.

Another integral part of the trip was delivering school books throughout the Chuuk Outer Islands. We are once again so thankful to Ayuda Foundation, Pacific Island Movers, and Matson Shipping for the acquisition and transport of these books. Many of these islands hadn't received new books in several years. Most books donated were from Guam schools, although donations came from several benefactors. Most books were secondary education materials, although a number also included books for all ages and interests.

Prior to our trip, Enok, an official in the Chuuk education system and a partner of PMA, journeyed from his home in Tol, Chuuk to Pohnpei to organize the books according to each island's needs. Every island was happy to greet the Sea Haven and showed their gratitude in a myriad of ways. Some islands treated us to dances, others brought us local cuisine including coconuts, and a few gave us sumptuous fresh fish.

However, the greatest manifestation of their thankful spirits could be seen, not through what they gave but how they gave it. Our trip didn't quite last three weeks but I don't think it's overstating matters to say that it made an indelible impression on the lives of many people, both on the ship and on the islands. Through the delivery of schoolbooks and water stills, many children and families will have a better education and a higher standard of living that may not have been available without PMA's assistance. While many benefits will be reaped in the future from this three-week tour, many more trips must be taken, and much more work must be done, to continue to improve the body, mind, and soul of these peoples. That's why this wasn't an isolated venture but a part of an ongoing, dependable ministry that PMA provides throughout the Islands of Micronesia.

Our PMA team moved quickly to keep the church going and provide stability for the church family.

Amos and Heidi Collins had been working successfully with the youth and now continue to do so. They provide transportation to the weekly Bible studies in their home, which also include fun social events, and working on special music and skits for the young people to perform at the Sunday morning services.

Simon Hämmerling continues to provide leadership for the worship team. He chooses songs to coordinate with the sermon, practices twice a week with other guitarists and singers, and does a great job of leading the church in worship each Sunday.

Simon Weibel, a short-term volunteer from Switzerland, involved himself with youth activities, helping behind the scenes, and by accompanying Sunday morning worship songs on his trumpet.

My pilot husband, Vince, has taken on the job of preparing and delivering a sermon every Sunday. He's currently teaching Advent messages on the Old Testament promises that point to Jesus Christ. He's also providing overall leadership for the church, along with Peter Haleyalgiy - who translates the sermons and coordinates events-- and the other men of the church. And I continue to enjoy working with the children in Sunday school on Sundays and Wednesday evenings.

Peter and Esther Reichert just returning from furlough will be plugging in to our different ministries, along with leadership of the church.

We are so blessed by the Lord for the cooperation shown by the individual members of our Yap team, and for the strength He's giving us to take on this extra work that's over and above the operation, care and maintenance for PMA's aviation ministry.

Diamonds... No Thank You!

She was a true Hawaiian beauty, tall and slender. She came with her Caucasian American husband to Palau to work for what was then the U.S. Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. In 1957 when we arrived in Palau, they were already there.

In late 1957 I began conducting English Worship services, primarily for the Trust Territory employees from different denominations. The huge living room of a former missionary became the venue for these services. The news about the English services spread quickly throughout the island and more Americans attended.

One day, this much-admired Hawaiian beauty surprised all of us by joining our small group of worshippers. A few weeks later, she asked for an appointment with me for counseling. When we met, she could not keep her composure and with flowing tears, she unloaded her burden which seemed to have devastated her marriage and life.

As she addressed the infidelity of her husband, her speech was often interrupted with sobs and body shaking. Toward the end, she became so incoherent that I could hardly understand her. To help her come to a peaceful solution to her tragic situation, I asked her to come back with her husband so that I could counsel them both.

Confirming his unfaithfulness to his wife, he begged for her forgiveness. She granted this immediately with hopes of restoring their marriage and broken relationship. What I witnessed was beautiful, so touching – trust restored, love extended. Powerful! I was happy to be part of this restoration of their trust and love for one another.

However, that restored state did not last very long. The husband again broke his promise, leaving her more devastated than before. Now she not only needed my help, but also needed medical assistance for her mind and body.

Her husband, wanting to save her from a mental and physical breakdown and seeing the consequences of his actions, tried to re-establish a relationship with his wife. She came to me saying that he was giving his assurances yet again to be faithful. And so she would believe him, he had purchased her a beautiful diamond ring to seal his words of fidelity. She began to cry and said with trembling lips, "Diamonds? No thank you! I don't need diamonds, what I need is true faithfulness of his love for me alone."

After this experience her mental and physical deterioration continued. Her physician tried to put her on the next flight to Hawaii, but she adamantly refused. As a last resort, they called me to help them make her understand that she needed help that was not available in Palau.

Taking her hand, I helped her board the aircraft, and even fastened her seatbelt. And silently I was praying for her.

Broken promises, a devastated life and shattered love. This is not uncommon in this world of ours, even now 50-some years later. There remains only one way to find real change and to restore inner strength, peace and joy. No... not diamonds, nor anything else in this world, only through Him who said, "I am the Way the Truth and the Life." All answers to our human needs are found in Him alone, our Lord Jesus Christ!

After over 50 years, Pastor Ed Kalau faithfully preaches the unfading Word of God that brings real hope, joy and peace to mankind.

A Mission Story... God's Plans for Our Good

THE MID 80's: My wife Edna and I had our heart's desire to be responsible and Godly parents as we laid our family's foundation. Edna faithfully (and patiently) took care of our young children - Sharon (5), Sheryl (3), and Jeffrey (1) and our modest home. I was employed with Swift Air, Zamboanga City (Southern Philippines) as an aircraft mechanic.

SUMMER 1985: I got acquainted with Capt. Ernesto Mangaoang who invited me to a weekly Friday afternoon Bible study. Through an invitation one day, I accepted Jesus as my personal Lord and Savior. I shared this same Gospel of salvation with my wife Edna, and this led her to a relationship with Jesus, too. The fire of my conversion led me to start a Bible study with Edna's family; this paved the way to the conversion of the whole family! I continued the Bible study at our home to help these new believers grow in their walk with the Lord.

OCTOBER 1985: I joined PMA Philippines (at that time Flying Medical Samaritans) in Zamboanga City. After seven months, Chief Pilot Capt. Mangaoang assigned me to FMS/PMA Laguna (near Metro Manila). Edna took on the position as bookkeeper and I was hired as aircraft mechanic. Our mission had an airstrip at Yulo in Canlubang, Laguna. Soon we started another Bible study at the mission house.

JULY 1986: Edna and I were baptized in Laguna. Our fellowship grew and is still thriving as "Christ the Lord Immanuel Church." I was actively involved in the CARE ministry. Edna was also involved in the music ministry. My children found places to serve in music and drama: Jeffrey as drummer & guitarist, Sheryl in the choir, and Sharon was interested in drama.

FMS/PMA expanded to the Polilio Island group in Quezon province. We worked with PMA's on-going floating clinic, meeting the medical needs of the very remote islands of Palawan and Batanes. The mission was challenging; I spent long days at the hangar to take care of the airplanes, especially during the stormy season. I was able to assure our staff of our well-maintained aircraft. As the mission grew and the staff increased in number, our spiritual growth was on fire. And, of course, our growing mission was now a target for the enemy's possible destruction. Additional staff were hired and sometimes departed, after being discouraged by trials. Problems were sometimes difficult to handle. But by God's

grace, my family and I stood firm and were assured of God's promise in Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

LATE 2009: Today I continue to serve the Lord patiently, and He has increased my talents and skills according to the needs of the mission. Edna continues to be a valuable part of our mission, providing administrative assistance in our PMA Philippines HQ Office and Medical services.

We declare God's success in our lives. We are fully dependent on His will and grace for us. Our whole family continues to serve the Lord. Sharon is happily married and working with an airline company in Singapore. Sheryl, also happily married, has two children, Andrew (7) and Psalm (5) and works for a telecommunication center in Laguna. Jeffrey is now an airline mechanic and asking God to direct him to the right job.

We cannot ask for more, because the Lord has already provided us with more than enough! In a few months, I will complete 25 years of service with PMA. I entrust my future plans to the Lord. I thank Him for all He's given me and my family. And I thank Him for who He's making me. "To God be the glory for the things He has done!"
