Palau Hangar Project

"Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the LORD our God." Psalm 20:7

When we look back at what the Lord has accomplished PMA's flying services in Palau, we cannot help but be in awe of His work. For over 40 years, PMA has been serving the Federated States of Micronesia, and in Palau through PMF church ministry for 31 years. Our aviation services in Palau only started 4 years ago. A dream realized at last!



PMA's temporary hangar is made up of shipping containers, barely protecting the aircraft from the severe tropical storms and typhoons that frequent the region.

PMA provides transportation to the outer islands, free medical evacuations, free referral of patients to the hospital, search and rescue for those lost at sea and air drops of medicines. We also have sightseeing tours for the tourists to help generate revenue so that we can continue to provide our free humanitarian services to the people of Palau.

Last year, PMA signed an MOU with the Palau Ministry of Health, Ministry of Justice, Ministry of Public Infrastructure, Industries and Commerce, and the National Marine Sanctuary office. This MOU was put into place to establish clear protocols for the various services in this partnership.

The Republic of Palau National Marine Sanctuary office has asked us to partner with them in protecting their Marine Sanctuary. To date we have flown many sorties in coordination with their Department of Safety, Department of Justice, and the Australian Government Department of Defense in surveillance efforts to catch and apprehend poachers and illegal fishing boats that are invading Palau's waters. Some very successful sorties have resulted.


In order to better serve the Republic of Palau in protecting their Marine Sanctuary, the first of its kind in the world, along with our other services, we were awarded a lease at the new apron across from the Palau International Airport for the construction of a 122' by 120' hangar. At this time, we are operating and maintaining our aircraft out of two 20' containers on the ramp.

This is a big undertaking for us at PMA as we are a non-profit mission organization. But as in the past, we are trusting in the Lord for provision and the realization of this project. At the moment, we are at 57% of the needed funding of \$1,000,000! The Lord is faithful!

As always, God has already been using people and companies to partner with us in this project. Support donations from friends and partners are being received. Higher Power, a company who builds hangar doors has donated a 100' by 24' hangar door. Dick Ruckman of Superstructures has been a great help in the fabrication of the hangar. The CAT team in Palau is helping us in the preparation of the construction site. And of late, Matson Navigation has approved for us to ship all containers stateside to Palau at half the cost!

Yes, as we trust in the Lord, He will touch hearts so that this project will come to fruition and it will be for His honor and glory!

Pacific Mission Aviation's new facilities at Palau International Airport will be a major milestone in growing the aviation ministry in this island paradise, where many remote islands are dependent on air service. Pray with us for the remaining funds for this project.

Arjay was admitted into our Bahay Kalinga Orphanage on July 9, 1999. He was 1 year and 10 months old at that time. He did not look well as he had a large spleen that gave him a protruding belly. His biological mother, provoked by continuous physical abuse and neglect from her husband, fought back and caused his early death. She surrendered to the authorities, but after a week, she was sent out of jail because there were no complaints against her.

The mother continued to have bad relationships and into one of those relationships, Arjay was born. Life was getting too hard for this mom, consequences of wrong choices overwhelmed her, until she had to make a decision to give up Arjay for adoption. And this is where Bahay Kalinga opened its arms to care for and love Arjay. His health and demeanor improved. He was responding to the love and care the caregivers gave him.

At age 3, Arjay was adopted by a Danish couple, Johnny and Tina, and with his acceptance into this family, he acquired an additional name: Casper. He is now 19 years old and has just finished high school. Tina shared that his first three months in Denmark were tough. He was very frustrated because everything was new. But soon, he developed an understanding of Danish and could have small conversations. He also learned to be a responsible member of the household and took part in small chores.



Casper's visit to his former orphanage home was a joy for him, family and caregivers alike. A story with a happy end!

Teenage Casper shared that he was not stuck in the past, however always thought about visiting the orphanage where he had come from and also learn who his relatives were. On July 17, a day before going to BK he was able to meet his biological mother and his sister. It was a great reunion, and he had a hard time saying good-bye to them.

His message to us was: "Thank you all at BK for taking care of me, and giving me this life. You will always be a part of me." As a simple thanksgiving, he gave BK a gift card. We are truly thankful to God for this visit. This is once again a testament that our labor in the Lord is not in vain.



"Everest VB\$" – \$now in Pohnpei?

Every year, about 170 children attend the PMF Vacation Bible School in Pohnpei. As early as May the older children and the parents inquire about the VBS date. Under no circumstances do they want to miss the registration date! Many months before, Sylvia Kalau starts researching for curriculum. This year would be the theme of "EVEREST" – imagine... snow in tropical Pohnpei!

It just so happened that the 2015 Everest program was no longer available. Sylvia was able to send a request out for the curriculum in March using Facebook. She received positive replies from 3 churches in the US who would be willing to send their used materials to Pohnpei.

Early June we recruited the volunteer helpers. About 50 youth signed up as team leaders for the individual children's groups. The teen volunteers were dedicated in coming to practices weekly to prepare for the singing, dance moves and leadership skills training. Nob Kalau and his A-team built huge cardboard snow mountains for the stage and hung numerous paper snow-flakes. 7 Sunday school teachers prepared the Bible lessons depicting the story of Elijah. During Bible lesson rotation, the children learned that God:

Over 5 weeks, a team of helpers prepared the crafts which always related to the individual topic of the day. 3 strong men prepared the games which challenged the teams with lots of competitive fun. A special highlight for me was the coconut husking and grating. The girls won that competition! 10 ladies prepared snacks for refreshments daily and at the end of each day, the more that 60 helpers received a substantial lunch.

We started VBS at 8 o'clock in the morning. While the children were being registered, the volunteers and leaders had a devotion and prayed together for God's guidance for the day. Smaller children who on the first morning would shyly hide behind mom, ran to their team leader and were completely part of the action from the second day on.

In the weeks before our big event, we had prayed for no rain between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. The first day during VBS registration, it was pouring rain Pohnpei-style. I sat on the porch outside the Bible room and once more prayed intensely. 10 minutes later, the children would be coming out of the church from the "Base Camp" and be guided to the various stations. Our God is so great! The rain stopped just before the kids lined up to go outside. It was as if God had closed a faucet and the sun came out.

On the last day, in Bible class, many children said the prayer that they wanted to live with Jesus. To hear that gave me a special feeling that I can hardly describe. God be praised who gave the volunteers, the strength, the joy, the resources, and the weather that His seed could be planted in the hearts of many Pohnpei children. Our God is great and "wants everyone to be saved and to understand the truth". 1 Timothy 2:4.

To Him be the glory and honor!


Every summer, the PMF church gets involved in several outreach events. Our summers are full of activity and also of blessing as we see God at work here!

The first was a VBS put on by all the Evangelical churches in Yap. Children from Yapese, Outer Island, Palauan, and Western backgrounds came together for the week to learn about the "I AMs" of Jesus. They loved the music, games, crafts and stories, and the leaders did too!

Following close on its heels was the annual Youth Retreat, again organized by the evangelical churches in all their cultural diversity. The topic mirrored Jesus' "I AMs" of the VBS but went into more depth with speakers and discussion groups. A team of young people came from the United States and shared their testimonies and their lives with the youth all week. It is always an encouragement to the local youth and the leaders when U.S. teams come; their contribution to this event is huge.


Not long after the Youth Retreat, the PMF Church held its own VBS outreach for the Outer Island children living on Yap. This is a little different than the combined VBS, in that it specifically seeks to reach unchurched Outer Island kids in their own language. About 90 children came this year, and they had a fun time learning about the God who loves them and playing in a happy, healthy environment. The theme was "Jonah", and each day Pastor Petrus explained a little more of the story to the children, teaching them about obedience to God and daily memory verses. A lot of love and muscle was put into this event, and the PMA aviation crew even found time to construct a giant fish out of sheet metal for the children to crawl in and "play Jonah"! Many of these children come from difficult family situations or feel neglected. They really responded to the attention lavished on them during this week. On the closing day, parents were invited to watch their children share what they learned during the week. And they heard the gospel.

While the VBS program went on in the mornings, the afternoons and evenings were devoted to another outreach: a Bible Training Workshop to explain and teach the Word of God to adults. A three-man team of Bible teachers from Lance and Lana's sending church, Centerville Christian Fellowship, flew to Yap to help lead the training. Thankfully, the ship from the Outer Islands arrived on time, bringing some people who wanted to attend. Additionally, PMA flew in two plane loads of adults and their children from Ulithi, and several people already living in Yap also joined the workshop. In all, there was a total of about 30 people attending faithfully every night to learn the basics of the Christian faith. Volunteer drivers picked up and dropped off the attendees every day, the PMF ladies cooked delicious meals, and church members provided babysitting for more than 20 kids so the parents and other adults could soak up the teaching content without distractions.



All of the teachers from Ohio had great and powerful testimonies and lectures. I hope someday they can come teach also at Bayview Church. The week was possibly the hardest but most rewarding. It was amazing to experience a third world church work to full capacity and teach the Gospel to children and adults. I especially enjoyed working in the VBS and interacting with the kids games and activities. I was sad that I had to leave the next Saturday night due to College events coming up, but hope to come back very soon and work with hard working and God-loving men and women of PMA and PMF.
