Palau Hangar Project: With the property lease signed we are underway to construct the hangar. For the funding of the Palau Hangar Project, we need to raise the following: Phase I: \$300,000.00: Raised, Phase III: \$400,000.00: still needed.

Outer-island airstrip in the Philippines: The Lord has provided land for an airstrip centrally located for easy access to all our istand stations. Needed funding for this project: \$70,000.00. We thank God for His provision of a Cessna-206 for the Philippines.

God is with our pilots as they fly over ocean, ocean, ocean delivering passengers, flying cargo, searching for missing boats and people, bringing patients to the hospital, dropping much needed medicine via a parachute on an island with no runway. God is with us we sail with Sea Haven over formidable reefs to get to outer islands. God is with us as we carry out medical clinics for remote villages. God is with us as we build friendships, lead Bible studies, send out the good news via radio, work in the office, live the Gospel of Jesus Christ. God is with us... and in this fact, we rest and continue to serve.

I just returned from the Philippines and a short retreat with our Filipino pastors and co-workers. What a great group of men and women. As they serve in the isolated islands of the Philippines, how important for them to know that God is with them. The Bible never teaches that we will have problem-free lives as followers of Christ. But the Bible does teach that we will never be alone. That is the message that this sinsick world is longing to hear: Immanuel – God is with us.

Palau Hangar Update

For over 5 years PMA's Aviation Ministry in the Republic of Palau has been operating out of a temporary hangar made of two 20ft. containers and a tin roof. This hangar has served its purpose, but we are looking forward to a safe, efficient, and permanent hangar that will withstand and protect us from the types of weather we experience in the Western Pacific. In 2016 PMA was granted a lease on the newly constructed secondary apron of the Palau International Airport. If you read our Island Echoes, you will know that PMA has been raising funds as we move forward to build this hangar, trusting the Lord for His provision and timing.

Thank you to those of you who have been praying and supporting this project. I would like to update you with the current progress.

The 120ft. x 122ft. hangar has been designed, ordered, and fabricated in the U.S. and is being packed into 40 ft. shipping containers ready for shipping.

The massive 100ft. wide hangar door was provided as a donation from a Christian company called Higher Power in Michigan. It is currently being prepped for shipping.

The concrete slab and walls have been engineered and designed to handle the structure.

All the windows, and doors have been ordered and are being packaged for shipment.

The prep work at the leased lot of the airport is progressing:

We have been delayed a couple months due to weather and finding a suitable contractor to move the earth, but we finally have a company who started two weeks ago and is progressing wonderfully. We expect to have the ground cleared by the end of the year. Once the ground is clear, the foundation work can begin.

Shipping containers will start arriving in Palau at the beginning of the year.

Funding: To date we have been able to raise 70% of the total cost. We remain debt free and are trusting the Lord to still provide the remaining 30% as we proceed with the construction of this hangar.

Even before we began this project, we had a friendship with a Christian engineer, Dick Ruckman, who has decades of experience in hangar structures. He not only is supplying the building, but he also has all the contacts for providing all the miscellaneous parts of the building. From engineers to draw our floorplans, to window and door suppliers, Dick has poured all his energy into making this project come together and we would not be where we are today without him.

We have also been blessed to find an American engineer who lives in Palau who is willing to work with us to accomplish this monumental project. He has a very good reputation in Palau and knows his way around every aspect of construction, from foundations, to septic, to electrical and plumbing. We could not be where we are without his help.

We want to thank you, our partners for faithfully standing with us. We will give you another update as we finish the next phase.

Earth moving begins! In order to prepare the lot of our hangar project we have to move approx 7,000 cubic yards or 700 truckloads of dirt.



About a month ago, this man's wife was murdered. The sad truth is that no matter where you go, or how beautiful a place is, sin still abounds. This is the reason God sent His Son and sends His followers to distant lands; to spread the Gospel message. From that one tragic event, a ripple effect began to happen.

The man and his wife are part of the Chinese Evangelical Church. After finding out about the tragic death, some Palauan pastors came to comfort the grieving husband. The pastors admitted they did not know what to say. The first words out of the husband's mouth was, "I have already forgiven him (the murderer)". The pastors were amazed at the faith of the grieving husband.


A candlelight vigil for the wife was held. The victim's family wanted to raise awareness of the crime and drug problem that is increasing in the islands. Many people showed up for the event, and it was well received. From the vigil, the next ripple happened.




The weekly Bible study outreach in Ulithi has been a great encouragement to our brethren there. We thank God for their hunger for His Word.

The PMF team was warmly welcomed, and the service began in a mechanics shop classroom at the Outer Islands High School that had been damaged by typhoon Maysak 2 years ago. About 50 people attended, including many children and youth. The young people had formed their own choir and sang with all their hearts – it was beautiful to witness. A young woman named Tess gave her testimony, talking about how the Word has shaped her life. She was followed by a young man named Lance, whose impromptu testimony was very moving. He talked about how he has often been judged for his past deeds, but how he had been encouraged by Jesus' words in Luke: "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners, to repentance." (This young man has expressed an interest to be trained in leadership by Petrus). Pastor Petrus preached a powerful message on salvation, and seeing the youth riveted on his words and the subsequent eagerness of 22 people who signified to follow Christ was indeed the highlight of the day!

After that, many more songs and special numbers were shared together, and finally a delicious meal prepared by the ladies was served as everyone ate and talked and visited with each other. This group's hospitality was tremendous, and it was altogether an unforgettable day.

Please pray for the people of Ulithi; for this small band of believers and for their community. We would like to see the Good News firstly convict people of their own sin and lead them to repentance and trust in Jesus. Secondly, that they would live out their new lives in Christ in such a way that they positively overflow with the love and truth of the gospel, so that their families and neighbors will want to know Him also. Simon becomes Director of Maintenance

Aviation is a unique field, where man has defied gravity to soar at great heights and at great speeds. Mission aviation has then pushed it to some extremes by landing the aircraft on difficult strips or operating in harsh environments to reach the people they serve. To make that sustainable, most mission organizations make excellent airmanship and maintenance top priorities. We do not have the difficult sloped bush

runways of Papua New Guinea to land on, but we have a vast ocean that we must fly over here in Micronesia. That is when you want to make sure the maintenance of the aircraft has been done right!

Maintaining our PMA aircraft is a full-time job. Whenever we are not flying, there is always something to be done on the

aircraft. Whether it is doing a recurring inspection, changing a part, doing a repair, or cleaning corrosion off the metal and painting because of the salt sea environment, the list is endless. And to manage all of that, there needs to be someone who has an intricate knowledge of the aircraft. Keeping track of when the inspections are due, when components need to be replaced, when to send parts in for overhaul, are all controlled by our Director of Maintenance. He is the one whose ultimate responsibility it is to keep our aircraft maintained properly so that we can operate safely here in the islands.

Simon Hämmerling, at the age of 19, first visited PMA in November of 2002. His love for airplanes and mission work led him to leave his home in Germany and move to the small island of Yap, Micronesia, where PMA had an aviation base. At that time, the station manager was Peter Reichert. Peter took Simon under his wing and trained him up to become an aircraft mechanic.

Having a background as an auto mechanic, Simon excelled and soon became a U.S. certified aircraft mechanic.

Simon faithfully served PMA as a mechanic for years, while his passion for flying also tugged at his heart. In 2012, Simon moved to Oregon. There, he learned to fly, became a flight instructor, and built up the necessary flight time that PMA requires to fly in Yap. In 2015, Simon returned to Yap, where he then put on the pilot's uniform and began serving PMA in both capacities of pilot and mechanic.

Simon possesses the qualities that Germans are known for: he works very hard, has an eye for detail, and does excellent work. His mind is sharp at troubleshooting problems and he works hard at something until he is able to figure out the solution. As Simon continued to care for the aircraft, his knowledge and experienced increased, and before long it was clear that he should manage the maintenance of our aircraft.

In July of this year, with the approval of our FAA Maintenance Inspector, Simon took on the role of PMA's Director of Maintenance. This responsibility is not taken lightly. An aviation operation like this, which is so isolated geographically from any support requires months of advance planning in order to have parts here on time. PMA has an excellent reputation with the FAA due to the high standard at which we have done our maintenance. We wish Simon all the best in his new role and are confident that he will continue to maintain that reputation for PMA in the years to come.
