Hangar for Palau: We thank God we are close to completing the hangar construction. We still need to raise \$200,000.



Proclaiming His Praises in the Islands

"Let them give glory to the LORD and proclaim His praise in the islands." Isaiah 42:12

The annual visit to the islands was upon us again! We greatly anticipate our visit to our island stations in the Philippines especially as we (stationed in Guam and Pohnpei) will be able to spend time with our mission staff.

Nob Kalau, Dr. John Escote, Geneziel and I, left Manila at midnight. It took us two hours in traffic, until we left the road going to the Port of Real, Quezon to catch a boat to Patnanungan. We had not anticipated a religious procession to take place in the early morning hours as people walked to Antipolo on a pilgrimage. We arrived in Real at 5:30 AM and by 9 AM were on our way to our base at Patnanungan Bayan.

Upon arrival, we rested a bit and trekked to where our airstrip was located in order to assess the property and what was needed to be done to clear the area and fence it in. Fred, PMA Chief Mechanic, had visited the site earlier in order to provide us with an estimate on how much it would cost to fence off this 50,000 sq. ft. property.

Before our visit, our stations scheduled Vacation Bible School (VBS) so that the staff could focus on our annual conference. The theme for this year was "Shield Squad -Secure in God's Protection" with Psalm 46:1 as the theme verse. The children learned to trust the Lord in everyday life experiences and during life's adversities - He is our refuge and strength! Our team in Patnanungan, headed by Teacher Mercy, conducted VBS in the PMF churches in Kilogan (3 days), Patnanungan (5 days) and Guinaygayan (3 days). She was ably assisted by Deleta and Amor from PMF Patnanungan and Amor and Jenny from PMF Guinaygayan. Mercy was encouraged by their love, patience and perseverance, as well as the supportive presence of Bro. Hardy in Kilogan, Bro. Bryan in Patnanungan and Pastor Marty in Guinaygayan. These VBSs were well attended by a total of 167 children. PMF Jomalig and Apad, likewise completed their 5 day VBS headed by Pastor Jun and wife Baby, capably helped by Roly, Marie and Jersil. Apad had an average of 60 children in attendance, while Jomalig had 50. For PMF Amaga a 5-day VBS was conducted by Pastor Jose and wife Gemma with 53 children in attendance. By the time we arrived, only PMF Catmon and Calutcot remained to conduct a VBS. This would be scheduled after we departed.

Our visiting team wanted to experience what our pastors and staff experience when they travel to our stations to conduct worship services and visitation. So for the first day, we visited 4 Stations of PMA – Kilogan, Catmon, Guinaygayan and SM Village. We were 8 on motorcycles (2 on each motorcycle.) We drove over very rough terrain, stony ground, over exposed roots of trees, into jungles, got rained on, then dried by the heat of the sun, up and down steep, bumpy, hardened clay, dusty mountain trails and over dry sea shores! We started at 6 AM and returned to base at 5 PM. Very tired, body aching, but rejoicing in being able to visit our staff, congregations, and have special times with them. We were served fresh coconuts in Catmon and a great sea food lunch which included lobsters in Guinaygayan.

The second day, we visited Amaga and Calutcot using our small boat "Evangel". The island was very dry. As in our first day, the sun's heat was overwhelming, but it was great to visit with Pastor Jun Tayangona and his family. They have experienced a severe drought and have to fetch water from the mountain which is a kilometer away from their home. Pastor Jose looked at the situation positively – he was building muscle and getting healthy in the process. We looked around the premises for an area where a well could be dug. He informed us that after digging 12 feet (manually), one strikes rocks, and still no water. We noticed though that the plants and trees were alive and green, so there must be water underneath, we just need heavy equipment to dig deeper. Please pray for God's provision for this. The family prepared a seafood lunch for us with a special seaweed called "Latu" which was enjoyed by everyone!

The third day, we set sail for Jomalig. When we arrived – we went with motorcycles to visit PMF Apad. It took us about an hour and 45 minutes over very dusty, uneven, curvy roads with the heat of the sun unmercifully beating down on us. We saw the property that we had just purchased which included a small house that we are using for a house church. According to Pastor Jun Mandreza, this is now too small for the fast growing church. We pray for the Lord to provide for a church building. We returned to Jomalig and enjoyed conversations and fellowship over a sumptuous lunch prepared by sister Baby (wife of pastor Jun) and sister Merlyn, a church member .

Philippines PMA/PMF staff look forward to the annual get-together to where each one can fellowhip, laugh, learn, pray and share with one another. A great time of bonding!



Every evening, PMF pastors and mission staff met together for a teaching series by Nob Kalau – "Disciple Making" – Dr. John translated. We learned a lot, asked questions, and discussed what we learned. Each one understood what we need to do in order to win the island to the Lord – and that is to make disciples, the Lord's way. We pray that He will give each one the courage and perseverance to grow our church – by loving all people, building one another in grace and truth, and discipling the faithful to be fishers of men who will be able to teach others also.

Every night, we met one-on-one with our staff and those who serve with us. Sometimes our meetings went beyond midnight, and we had to be up before 5 in the morning. However, I am very thankful for these remarkable times with each one as they shared their joys, what the Lord is accomplishing in their lives and in the church, their burdens and difficulties. These moments are what we came for – to know our team in a deeper way and to somehow share in whatever they are going through. Before I left for these islands, I prayed for the Lord to enable us to listen and hear what He wants us to hear, to see what He wants us to see and know the heartbeat of our mission staff. Our time with them is never enough, but I praise God for each of them as they endeavor to serve Him with all their heart, soul and mind.

After leaving for Manila, the following day, we went by land to Naujan, Mindoro (using a ferry boat from Port of Batangas to Calapan). Our time was short but very fruitful at Bahay Kalinga Orphanage. We spent time in encouragement, dialogue and answering questions. We also met our new social worker, Karen, who is settling in very well. I got to hold baby Angela whose story is on the next page. One may harshly judge her mother – but we cannot fully know and understand where she was coming from and what she was going through. We pray for her as well that she will find peace and forgiveness in the Lord.

A fast-paced, short visit, yet the Lord allowed us to see His goodness and faithfulness in the lives of our mission staff and PMA. To Him be the glory, now and forever!



Angel in a Blue Bag

At 5:30 AM on March 21, a Filipina homeowner opened her front door and saw a blue plastic bag hanging on her gate. She was startled and apprehensive because this bag was moving. Without looking inside, she quickly took the bag to the house of the local councilman who was her neighbor. She was afraid of opening the bag without a witness, and that it may have a snake or something that would hurt her. Upon opening the bag, both

the lady and the councilor were surprised to find a newborn baby, still with her umbilical cord, alive and kicking! They immediately reported the finding to the police who came to pick up the baby, brought her to the rural health clinic, called Bahay Kalinga, who informed the local Department of Social Services.

She was observed for 12 days at the rural health clinic to make sure that she did not have any infection, as well as given the needed vaccinations for her age. She was then transferred to Bahay Kalinga for temporary care. Since we do not know who her parents are, she is considered a foundling. Bahay Kalinga now has the responsibility of making sure that the news of finding the baby is announced via radio and newspaper. In the event that no one claims her within the next three months, Bahay Kalinga will process her documents so that she can be available for adoption.

So many people came to visit and to find out if they could adopt Baby Angela (not her real name), however, they found that it is not that simple. Interested parents have to go through the Department of Social Services and undergo the agency's process of adopting a baby.

At Bahay Kalinga, we thank God for this angel the Lord sent to us in a blue bag. While with us, we will care for her and love her as our own, raising her in a way so that one day when she is united with her family (biological or adoptive) she will know that she is loved.

Thank you for praying for Baby Angela and for Bahay Kalinga. Thank you for supporting us. You really do make a difference in the lives of the children we serve. God bless you!

Bibles for the Islands!

Thanks to a generous donor, we have ordered and received most of the Bibles we needed for outreach in Yap. The giant print Bibles are a big hit as most of the older people have poor eyesight. The children received a few illustrated Children's Bibles to get acquainted with the Bible in a child-like language. One of our church members is headed back to her home island on the ship and her island people understand the Chuukese language, so we are sending some Bibles in the Chuukese language with her.

You will be pleased to hear a story from our outreach today. For many years we have not had an outreach to the islands that we fly to because we didn't have the staff or the means to be consistent. PMA as a mission is deliberate about being faithful if we start something. We don't want to do a oncea-summer outreach without any follow-up. So for a year-and-a-half now, our pastor has faithfully boarded the flight to the outer island of Ulithi once a week on Friday, and the pilot waits on the ground while he does a devotional and discipleship with the new believers. This outreach was heard about from people on the next island of Fais and the chief invited our pastor to come do something similar on his island. Most of these islands are following the Roman religion and do not get fed too much from the Scriptures. In Fais, Pastor Petrus was surprised to see the eagerness of a small group to dig into the Word and learn more about salvation and how to live like Christ. But it's not just the small group that hears the message, but anyone who comes to the terminal for the flight. After we unload the plane, we have prayer, and some singing, and then Pastor Petrus shares a word from the Bible. And about 50 people are there to hear it every week. So that is really cool.

Today in Ulithi, Pastor Petrus shared with me that our group had invited a new lady to the meeting. And as Petrus shared the gospel message of salvation, she was frantically copying down the Bible verses that he was referencing. When asked if she had ever heard these things before, she replied, "No! We never go this deep in our church." She said she was copying down the references so that she could go home later and really study those verses. So then Pastor Petrus took the opportunity to share the salvation message and asked her if she wanted to accept Christ as her Lord and Savior. She agreed, and then prayed to accept the Lord into her heart. What a great encouragement to pastor Petrus and to our team when we heard this news. Praise the Lord for a new believer!

Please pray for the island people as we bring the Word to them that they may know Him, grow in His Word and make Him known to their family, friends and island community.

I invited the young ladies who were baptized for a discipleship class and they eagerly accepted. It is always a privilege to learn how someone finds Christ and accepts Jesus' gift of salvation. Some of the new disciples wanted to share their testimony with you.

Milain shares: "I am 16 years old. Since my parents were not married, I was raised by my grandparents. They taught me about the Christian faith. My Grandma is a teacher in a Christian pre-school and brought me to the kids' Bible studies. How I enjoyed that! In fourth grade, Jesus Christ became really important in my life especially when I was taught that I could accept Him into my life in order to have a relationship with Him. One day I thought I heard God whisper into my ear: "You are ready!" I felt so touched that I told my grandma and she led me in the prayer to accept Jesus into my life. I was nine-years-old then and it was on a Thursday, I still remember! Earlier this year in youth meeting at PMF we talked about baptism. I asked God that if He thought I was ready... to please give me a sign. All of a sudden, my heartrate increased, and I got goosebumps all over. That was my sign. I was ready to obey the Lord in water baptism and there in the water I confirmed that I love Jesus as my Lord and Savior and want to follow him every day of my life. Then I went down into the water. Oh happy day!"

Justleen shares: "As my grandma was a Sunday School teacher, the stories of Jesus were a part of my life growing up. I believed in Jesus and His saving grace. Alliyah shares: "I am 16. Jesus was in our family for as long as I can remember. My mom taught me about the Bible and when I faced hard times growing up or felt alone and overwhelmed, I knew I could go to Jesus in prayer. I wanted to be baptized because I want to be closer to God and learn more and more about Jesus. The discipleship class will help me understand the Biblical truths and what I can do to follow Jesus and honor Him."

Abigail shares: "I am 14. In 7th grade my school's Pastor encouraged me with Phil 4:13, "*I can do all things through him who strengthens me.*" The passage in Ephesians 2:8-9 impressed me and I wanted to be saved and receive this gift from God. And I did. When I heard about baptism in PMF youth group, the question inside me kept coming up "are you ready for this?" I was really tired of the sin in my life and wanted to learn more and more about Jesus and follow him. So my next big step was baptism. Now I want to learn more about following Jesus in the discipleship class."

From Sabine: As a PMA missionary, I would like to encourage all families to teach their children about God and His Word. Just like Timothy in the Bible who was taught by his grandmother Lois and his mother Eunice (2 Timothy 1:5), these young ladies learned about the Faith in the one living God and Creator of the Universe by growing up in a home led by their faithful grandmothers and mother. What a privilege we have to teach our children that God has given us to raise!
