Infrastructure Needs:

Church Building for Guinaygayan and Apad: We praise God for the generous donation of our partners - we have now received 100% funding for both PMF church buildings. Please pray for logistics for the building materials, manpower and supervision of these projects. The goal is to construct buildings that can withstand strong typhoon winds and rain.

Outer-Island Airstrip in the Philippines: Due to the Pandemic, Patnanungan Island has been on lockdown. Hence, CAAP (Civil Aviation Authority) still has to come and inspect the property. We are clearing the land and will start to put up the fence upon CAAP inspection. We still need \$50,000 for this project.

It was his feeding time. I saw firsthand how the caregiver patiently attended to his needs. The following morning, we watched the older children get ready for school. The Orphanage is a happy place for the children and one can see this on their countenance, hear this in their laughter and their openness to people. I praise God for allowing me to be with the children and the loving and dedicated staff. One of the girls accepted the Lord when Ethel shared the Gospel with her. What joy and blessing for us! Being there for their prayer time, bed time, play time and meal times were great privileges for us. We appreciate the warm welcome we received, the fun and laughter we had with the children. It is my prayer that God will continue to allow this home to provide a safe haven for the children and that the children will thrive spiritually, physically and emotionally in an atmosphere of acceptance and love."

Those that did not have the confidence to share the Gospel before, now could share with ease with the Bible verses they memorized that come with each color. How excited everyone was!

Some of the youth who attended found out that they too can teach and discovered that they had a desire to be a blessing to children! One participant was so nervous that she almost gave up because each one had to go up front and demonstrate how to share the Bible story. But with the encouragement of everyone, she completed the training and now serves with a heart to teach the children!

Truly, the Word of God is powerful and the hope we share in Him results in changed lives. The Lord's Plan

"The heart of man plans his way, but the LORD establishes his steps."

This verse from Proverbs 16:9 was echoing in my mind as we sat with a decision to make. Because of Covid, there are no flights in and out of the Palau this month. What do we do? I had just put in my resignation from Boeing in the beginning of December 2020 and had planned to book a flight for me, my wife and our 3 children to serve as full time missionaries where I would be

the base manager on the island of Palau. "Do we just wait here in Washington State until a flight opens up?" I prayed to God: I give you my plans with open hands. As I contemplated our options and continued praying, the phone rang. It was my home church. They asked what we were planning on doing with our house and if we would consider renting our house out to a single dad with 2 kids who was struggling to find a home. If we gave them our house, we would be "homeless". If we didn't, they would be. Rachel and I prayed about the decision and with a peace that passes all understanding, we trusted God and rented our house to the single dad. Soon after, we became aware of the opportunity to help with the new King Airs planes that Samaritan's Purse had donated to PMA. Also, there were some training classes that I could take that would be helpful with the King Airs, until a flight opened up in Palau. The Lord was establishing His steps as we were praying.

So, we closed up our shipping container, gave our house keys to the single dad, and away we went with open hands to exactly all the places He would want us to go. We have visited family, friends, supporters, and churches along the way. We have traveled through a total of 16 states and over 5,900 miles. As I reflect on our journey so far, I see God's provision, direction and hand in our path and how we were able to meet, minister and serve people along the way. Our windy path across the United States has been straight to every place God wanted us to go. God says in Proverbs: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths." Proverbs 3:5,6

While I was in Tennessee helping work on the King Airs, we were given permission by the Palau government to enter the country. We purchased our airline tickets, took a 14 day pre-travel COVID test that came back negative, and started a 2 week pre-travel self-quarantine per Palau's requirements. Eight days into the quarantine, we were notified by the Palau government that the flight we were approved and had tickets for, would no longer be carrying any passengers. This was a complete surprise to us, because we thought that God had finally opened the doors for us to travel. However, this was no surprise to God, who just has other plans for us. As the King Airs are finishing their modifications, we are heading to a two-week training course on all the systems of the King Air 200 and B200 in Wichita, Kansas. As I think about how many times our plans have changed, I think about how they are not getting interrupted, but rather guided by the hand of God so many times as an answer to our prayers. It just reminds me that we have a loving, caring God who is continually interested in every aspect of our lives and He is interested in every aspect of your life too. And He knows best!

Reward

About twice a month, I get a phone call from Peter Reichert (my predecessor who served with PMA for 36 years and is now retired in Oregon). When I tell him stories of what is going on, and especially when I say how busy we are, he always says, "If I were 20 years younger, I'd be out there in a heartbeat," or "If I could, I would do it all over again." This makes me ponder my service with PMA and I would have to agree that I cannot think of anything else I would rather be doing. I don't know what the future holds, but as far as I can see on the horizon, PMA is where God wants me and my family.

As we transition into the new KingAir planes that are coming to Yap this summer, we are actively writing our contacts and spreading the word to get more pilots and mechanics to come out and serve. Yes, we require "high-time-pilots", and we also expect them to support themselves, so it is very difficult to recruit pilots to come out to this remote place and not get paid as much as they could make at a commercial job. But if only they knew the rewards...

Out here, the aircraft becomes a lifeline to some very remote locations that might only see a ship come through 4 or 5 times a year. Our mission of "Bringing Hope and Changing Lives" is felt by the communities on these islands and we receive many expressions of thanks for the services we provide, such as the medical evacuations and the sea searches which are also the most rewarding for us as pilots. Two recent events come to mind in which we are certain that lives were saved as a direct result of the aircraft.

We thank God for a successful sea search! A 14-year-old boy out fishing with his friends at night when the anchor rope breaks and he drifts out to sea. The friends call the police and the police dispatch a local fishing vessel. In the morning PMA is called to join the search. After 2.5 hours of searching, one spotter on the plane sees the boat. The coordinates are sent to the fishing boat who comes and rescues the boy. The boy was at sea for a total of 14.5 hrs.





Another glorious day as we witnessed 10 believers follow the Lord in water baptism. We thank God for Pastor Petrus and wife Queen for their persevering work among the outer-islanders in Yap. To God be the glory!

On January 30, we were involved in a sea search for a young 14-year-old boy who had drifted out to sea one night when his anchor broke. We found him sitting in an aluminum boat out on the open ocean about 18 miles off shore. If he hadn't been found, he would have drifted for weeks out in the vast Pacific Ocean, which can be very unforgiving once you run out of drinking water.

On March 25, we landed in Ulithi on a regularly planned flight and the medic came out with news of a small 1-year-old boy who had fluid in his lungs due to pneumonia and was also severely dehydrated. On the return flight, we stayed at low altitude and told the ambulance to be ready because this boy was barely hanging on. Three days later the boy was recovering well and soon discharged.

These are recent examples of lives that were saved because of the service that PMA provides. What a great blessing to be part of a mission that reaches these remote islands!

The aircraft is also a tool for bringing the Good News. Several times a month, our PMF pastor will join the flights to the outer islands where he leads small group Bible studies. These small groups were permitted to meet by the chiefs because of the relationship we have made with the communities. We pray that these Bible Studies will build a strong foundation to the faithful disciples and raise up leaders in the church. And here on Yap, our PMF church had a baptismal service where 10 of our members were baptized. How rewarding that is to see the ministry here bear such fruit!

As we work to recruit pilots and other staff members to join our team, I wish we could convey that a decision to serve with PMA is one that they would not regret. But I also understand that it is not about me telling a person how exciting and rewarding this work is. It must be the Lord who reaches out, who calls and impresses people to come. And we are seeing it happen already! The Lord plucking people from all different walks of life to come out to Micronesia and use their skills to serve the people of these isolated islands.

For Such a Time as This

All of us, cherished readers, have gone through challenging times this past year. Plans were shattered, hopes dissolved and lifestyles disrupted. Never before in history has humanity undergone such a worldwide enforced conformity in view of facemasks and fears.

International travel was interrupted to a great extent until today and thousands of people – including many missionaries – could not return to the place they call home. During my furlough in Germany, I myself realized in March of 2020 that there would be no way to return to my ministry island of Pohnpei for a long time. For some weeks I felt stuck and had little perspective of what was to be done, until I realized that this would be the status quo for an indefinite period of time. Thanks to the internet, I was always able to communicate with my friends in Pohnpei, Yap and Guam and I was grateful that we did not lose touch. But how was I to occupy myself in Germany while waiting?

When I turned to the Lord for guidance, He reminded me of my life's motto "Bloom where you are planted". There is never a lost day that the Lord cannot use me in His ministry of reaching out to people wherever I am. I started praying for opportunities and little by little they came trickling in. I went on regular bike rides with a memory-challenged friend of my parents who was still very agile. Her daughter was so encouraged by my support that she asked for regular get-togethers over coffee and good conversation. She works for a newspaper and connected me with her editor who interviewed me about PMA's ministry. This special Christmas edition of their paper, had a circulation of over 200,000 in our county. What a special treat from the Lord!

After a sweet Skype talk with Elizabeth Kalau on the occasion of her 89th birthday, the Lord connected us for daily conversations over Skype. I could entertain Mom Elizabeth with German church songs, read the Bible to her in German and listened to her stories of times long past. What a sweet ministry that was until her passing in December. I treasure those hours.

Shortly after Elizabeth went to heaven, I received a WhatsApp message from my longest time friend, Ina, who had terminal cancer. She asked me to come to her side and assist her in her illness. I had 7 precious weeks with her before she passed. Through my assistance, she was able to stay in her own house and die peacefully in her own living room in the midst of her family. That spared her from the horrible lonely hours alone in a hospital room during Covid

times when so many precious people had to die alone. Those weeks of caring for my friend were very exhausting but since the Lord had assigned me, He also helped me. Many days I felt like He strengthened me and gave me an extra portion of energy.

Ina had a Mexican background and a lot of Latina friends here in Germany. They were all so supporting to me. I got to meet with most of them and could have meaningful conversations about the Gospel especially after Ina had passed away. I learned a lot about coping with bereavement (everyone grieves differently) and how to support the mourners.

I have learned to expect great ministry opportunities from the Lord TODAY and not to worry where I will be tomorrow or in May or in July. Yes, I miss my island of Pohnpei and my ministry opportunities with the Islanders, but I am a servant to the Lord Most High and He is the one to send my assignments. Jesus says in Luke 4:2 "the harvest is great, but the workers are few. So pray to the Lord who is in charge of the harvest; …" He sent me where I
