Dear Friends,

The Faithful One Guards Our Steps



It was our last day of visiting the PMA stations in the Polillo islands. We were late in going back to our base located in Patnanungan. Stuck at the PMF church in Calutcot with Pastor Ed and wife Beth, we waited for the high tide. But because of the delay, the Lord allowed me the time to speak to the brother of Pastor Ed, Pastor Erwin, who wanted to serve in the islands as well. God's delays are truly not His denials!

The night was dark as we traveled via our banca (a small two outrigger canoe) "Evangel", with our boat captain Bayani at the helm. The stars were all out displaying the splendor of God. The weather was good and our solar lights kept us aware of our surroundings. After $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours of travel, nearing the Patnanungan port, suddenly a great swell overcame us – rocking our small banca – and if the boat next to us had not have turned their lights on we would have hit them. The gusts were very rough, it rained slightly and there was thunder and lighting. What's more, the port did not have any lights on, contributing to the darkness of the night. Pastor Marty reminded us of the time the Lord was traveling with His disciples on a boat crossing a lake when He and His disciples experienced a great squall and the disciples feared for their lives. They awoke Jesus who was asleep and the Lord rebuked the wind and the waves and the lake was calm again. As we prayed, captain Bayani made the decision to bring our banca closer to the shore and we all jumped out and arrived safely at the base, albeit soaking wet, with muddied feet! Thanks be to God!



At the end of the trip, we had a meeting with all our pastors, their wives and workers and each one shared their praises and prayer requests. We had a great time of worship singing and praying together as a group.


Then followed a trip to Naujan, Mindoro, where we had a good visit with our Bahay Kalinga staff and the children. The children presented us with a Poem about

Healing as Jesus Heals

Medical/Dental Outreach, Philippines

"And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven." James 5:15

A medical/dental mission was brought to the Polillo Islands, that was not planned but the Lord allowed to happen! We had difficulties gathering the volunteer doctors since most of them are not available if the medical mission lasts for 4 to 5 days. Purchasing medicine and antibiotics was a challenge due to restrictions, but praise be to God all of these hindrances disappeared. On October 5-10, 2023, a group of dentists, nurses and volunteers availed themselves to help in the mission. The whole team had a great joy and excitement to serve the people in the islands. With their 4-day-stay in the island we were able to serve two barangays (districts) wherein we also have PMF churches. There were 106 dental extractions in Busdak and 92 in Calutcot, and 91 medical check-ups in Busdak and 118 in Calutcot. Medicines were given to the patients and also vitamins for the children. But most importantly, our Pastors prayed with them and shared God's Word with the patients. As I looked at the medical team and our Pastors, I remembered what the Lord Jesus was doing during His earthly ministry...healing! And the healing that Jesus offered was not only for the physical needs of man but most importantly for their spiritual needs. Jesus gave physical healing like making the blind to see and the lepers were healed of their crippling leprosy. But above all He offered forgiveness, hope and salvation to every person He ministered to. As I reflected on Jesus' healing ministry, His example showed us how to do medical/dental outreaches by not only taking care of people's physical needs but also their spiritual health, giving them the hope and forgiveness in Jesus Christ.

The Filipinos were really open and kind to me, a German. I saw how each one of the medical/dental team members had a strong commitment and passion to help and invest their time in serving the Lord. Even though they themselves have limited resources of time and money, their hearts were into serving. The medicines and vitamins purchased by PMA were more than sufficient and we had many leftovers for another outreach. For me, it was a different challenge and a new impression. I saw how amazing it was that we could give so much help and joy with such a simple means as giving medical and dental care. It was shocking to me that many people don't have consistent access to medical care. For many industrialized countries, this is taken for granted and people seem to complain a lot if their expectations are not met. Anyone who is satisfied with little and still has so much joy in life can consider themselves blessed.

Orphan Joel Finds His Happy Ending

At two in the morning, Mrs. Garcia was awakened from her sleep with what sounded like a baby crying. She followed the cry to her backyard and found a naked, newly born, baby boy still attached to his umbilical cord lying on the grass! She immediately took the baby inside her home, cleaned him up, wrapped him in a warm blanket, and fed him a bottle of milk. As soon as government offices were open, she called the local Department of Social Welfare as well as the Philippines National Police.

Mrs. Garcia lives on a small island which is 197 km

away from Mindoro and would take 3 ½ hours travel by ferry boat.

Baby Joel was found July 2, 2022, and on the 18th of the same month, the local Social Welfare Office called us at Bahay Kalinga (BK) for the referral of the child for protection and for further case management. Joel was approximately 21 days old when he was admitted at BK. He is a lovely child with thick black-smooth hair. fair skin. rosv cheeks and adorable double dimples.

Fast forward to 2023 -Joel can now stand and walk on his own, without support. He can climb up on his crib and get down without assistance from a caregiver. When needs something, Joel knows how to draw attention. He dances when he hears music. He waves goodbye when the caregiver leaves Center and smiles and giggles to the incoming caregiver.

PMA-Bahay Kalinga secured all the documents needed to process his adoption and was finally issued a "Certificate Declaring a Child Legally Available for Adoption (CDCLAA). His case was then presented during the 5th Regional Matching Conference and was successfully matched to Prospective Adoptive Parents who are from an island north east of Mindoro. The matching process was done privately.

It was a happy occasion when Joel's parents arrived at BK. Joel immediately took to his new parents! We thank God for answering our prayers that yet another child from BK found a loving home!

"Our" children happily receive some "goodies" donated by generous people to Bahay Kalinga. We thank God for His provision – we have never lacked any good thing!




Sister Prayed it... Brother Made It!

Mary, a widowed elementary school teacher, has attended our PMF church in Pohnpei for 20 years. During that time, she has been praying for all of her family members to receive Christ. As a praise to God, her 4 children are all believers and she brings her nieces and nephews to church regularly. Many of these have received Christ and are faithfully attending Youth Group.

Mary lives in a compound surrounded by the families she is praying for. They are a daily reminder to her that she wants to see all of them in eternity. Each Saturday, she joins the PMF Ladies Prayer Warriors who meet at 7 am and pray through the requests given to them throughout the week. These are a very dedicated group of ladies who have experienced God's answers in amazing ways.



One of those praises happened for Mary this summer when her oldest brother Gonnally, the head of the clan, suffered a left sided stroke and had to go off island for medical treatment. Mary prayed. The ladies prayed faithfully. Upon Gonnally's return, Mary convinced him to come to church. He came. A few weeks later, He received Christ and then he came to Pastor Nob with an urgency, "I want to be baptized, I want to be baptized right away." What a joy for Nob to have Gonnally as part of the baptism class and explain the things of God to him. With great joy he, along with 4 others, was baptized on Sept. 3.

It was exciting to watch 50-year-old Gonnally grow. He is truly a new creation in Christ. He learned to depend on God as his own health was failing. On Sept. 19, two weeks after his baptism, Gonnally had to be rushed to the hospital. He had suffered an aneurysm. He died within the hour. Nob hurried to the hospital to comfort the family. The PMF church sprang into action helping with all the arrangements. Mary's youngest brother, WaWa, shared how he was overwhelmed by the love poured out to them by the PMF family. "And they aren't even our blood family" he said. PMF was invited to provide the evangelistic funeral services at the morgue, at the church and burial at the home, as well as the 10-day-post funeral service. "Praying Mary" is energized, "The Lord is coming soon and there are more relatives who need salvation!" And Gonnally? Monday and Friday mornings are pretty routine at PMA Yap. 7:30 AM checking in for the flight to Ulithi or Fais. Passengers bring their bags and relatives bring cargo to send on the flight for their families in the islands. Charlotte Hudson has been with PMA for 7 years and runs "point" in the whole process. She has her laptop next to the scale and is weighing passengers, their bags, collecting the payment and sorting the cargo into carts. One cart for passengers and one for cargo. Sometimes in the busy season, Charlotte has 4 flights in the day and is running 4 manifests at the same time with different planes and different destinations. When one flight is full, she rolls over into the next.

On these busy flight days, Juliana Adgil, who has been with PMA for 5 years, is at Charlotte's side assisting her with answering the phone, collecting the airport departure fees, helping to label the cargo, or sort the bags. Juliana also helps the people in the outer islands do their shopping on Yap and is busy packing the items she purchased into boxes to send to their owners. This is a small service that we provide when we have time, since there are people in the islands who cannot come to Yap to shop for their needs. Juliana receives a shopping list or sometimes a bank withdrawal slip on the previous flight with some money and then she will go shop or do the outer islander's banking. If people in the islands need cash, they often send down their ATM card or bank info for us to withdraw cash for them and send it back out. This is a trust that we are careful not to lose.



Grace Adgil is Charlotte and Juliana's immediate supervisor and has been with PMA for 20 years. Grace has the most experience with PMA office matters and is responsible for most of the bookings, flight scheduling, finances, and invoices. Grace is such an asset to our team and contributes immensely to decisions that need to be made as new things develop. Grace believes in the mission of PMA and is a team player. Whenever I travel off island, I am confident that Grace has the knowledge and wisdom to make the right decisions in my absence.

In the hangar, we have Tommy Gorong who has been with PMA for 24 years. He is reliable and dependable. Tommy is always ready and willing to come in early, stay late or even work on the weekends if necessary. Tommy knows where everything is and how everything should work. He is not a certified mechanic, but he has some specialty jobs like fueling and wheels & brakes that he has mastered. And if he is given a new task that he is not sure about, you can guarantee, that he will take it seriously and perform the task carefully. Tommy is a steady rock that is good for our team.


Grace's husband, David, has worked for PMA in the hangar for 10 years. Dave learned how to tow the aircraft, which is an art form with such limited space in the hangar. Our planes are parked within 1-2 inches of each other. Dave also has construction experience which is handy, especially as we always have building improvements or maintenance to do. Dave is the oldest on our crew and is well respected by everyone.

JR is our youngest in the hangar and early on he expressed an interest in getting certified as a mechanic. So, he is now in his third year as an apprentice A&P mechanic. Little by little we give him more responsibility and train him in all areas of maintenance to prepare him for his exams and career. With experience he will become a good mechanic and will continue to grow as an asset to our team.

Besides myself, our Yap Operation has two other missionary pilots. Paul Ciaramitaro joined our team in May 2023, and is committed to helping us for 1 year. Paul is a Moody Aviation Graduate and an A&P mechanic. Paul came to us from Dynamic Aviation and has a lot of experience flying the King Air. We are glad to have him with us, if only for a short time, as he has greatly reduced my workload by taking on most of the flights.

Our newest pilot, Jonathan Paulsen came to us from Germany and is committed for 3 years. Jonathan has been helping our Palau operation since July 2023 but will be moving here to Yap this month to begin his training in the Queen Air. Jonathan is also an A&P mechanic and will be a big help in the hangar when he is not flying.

Our flight operation in Yap has three planes and flies between 30 to 80 hours a month depending on the season. The demand has been slowly increasing and I am so thankful for a team that is here to do the work faithfully and with unity. We have a very good working relationship and it is a joy to come to work each day and serve alongside such an amazing group of men and women. Praise the Lord!
